



# Morningside named a top school for scholarships

The website "Student Loan Report" named Morningside College as one of the top 250 private U.S. colleges that award the most scholarship money to students. During the 2015-2016 academic year, Morningside awarded more than \$18 million in scholarships and grants to its undergraduate students.

#### College supports Second Year Experience

# Morningside launches program for community college students

Morningside launched a program this spring that creates a four-year plan for students to earn an associate's degree from Western Iowa Tech Community College and then a bachelor's degree from Morningside.

Morningside College Pathways is for students who intend to transfer to Morningside to earn a bachelor's degree in business and accounting, education or social and behavioral sciences.

Community college students admitted into the program also will receive a financial plan and financial aid award from Morningside.

They will be assigned a Morningside academic adviser, gain access to Morningside's advising and career planning tools, and be invited to participate in a variety of activities and events at Morningside, including being able to join performing arts groups.

As the time to transfer approaches, students will have the opportunity to register for Morningside classes and participate in the on-campus housing selection process at the same time as their rising-junior classmates at Morningside.


# MORNINGSIDE COLLEGE STARTS NEW WOMEN'S LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

# RECENT GRAD AWARDED FULBRIGHT

Mallory Sea 2016 recently received a Fulbright scholarship from the U.S. Department of State and the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board.



Sea is one of about 2,000 U.S. citizens who will study, conduct research or teach abroad for the 2017-2018 academic year through the Fulbright U.S. Student Program.

In early 2018, she will begin work on a master's degree at the

University of Auckland's Institute of Marine Science in New Zealand. She will conduct research in the Hauraki Gulf, where the institute is working on a shellfish restoration project. She will study how shellfish are improving the ecosystem.

"The entire Morningside College community is overjoyed and immensely proud that Mallory has been selected to participate in the flagship international educational exchange program sponsored by the U.S. government," said Morningside President John Reynders. "She is very deserving of this honor and joins the select group of Morningside graduates who have received a Fulbright award in the past."

Generally, about 10 percent of applicants are awarded a Fulbright scholarship, but only the very best students even apply, said Dr. Gail Ament, professor of Spanish and Morningside's Fulbright program adviser.

"I was just reading some statistics about the Fulbright - how many Nobel Prize winners, heads of state, Pulitzer Prize winners were Fulbrighters," Ament said. "They are leaders in every walk of life."

Just a few years ago, Sea had no idea what she wanted to do for a career. Early in her sophomore year, she expressed frustration to one of her professors. Dr Brian McFarland, associate professor chemistry, overheard the conversation, called her into his office, and invited her to do research with him. She gave it a try and loved it.

Her professors encouraged her to apply to summer research programs. So the summer after her junior year, she conducted research in Japan. Fewer than 5 percent of applicants were selected for the opportunity.

Sea wanted to spend the fall semester of her senior year at the

School for Field Studies in Panama, where she would learn about marine and terrestrial ecosystems. She proposed the idea to Reynders, and he helped her make it happen. It was in Panama that she realized she loved doing research in the ocean.

"I would always say, 'I could do that, I could do that.' With everything," Sea said. "When I got to Panama, it was like, 'Oh, I need to do that.' It felt so right to me."

Sea saw Ament's email to students about the Fulbright program. Before she could apply for an award to do research, Sea needed to find an institutional affiliation in the host country. She sent emails of inquiry and got a response from Dr. Simon Thrush, head of the Institute of Marine Science at the University of Auckland. Together, they developed a grant proposal.

Sea applied for a Fulbright one

year ago. She was chosen as an alternate but ultimately did not receive the award.

As a result, she spent a year doing whatever she could to improve her application. She traveled to Mexico and earned certification as a scuba diving instructor. She also applied to do research in Saudi Arabia this spring with the person who basically invented her field of science, and she was chosen for the program.

She applied again for a Fulbright through Morningside last fall and received the award. While she waits to begin her Fulbright experience, she is teaching scuba diving in Hawaii. Sea is excited about the future and credits Morningside for helping her find her way.

"Morningside is one of the best decisions I've ever made," she said. "It's been fantastic."

# GPAC All-Sports Trophy stays at Morningside

The GPAC All-Sports Trophy remained at Morningside after the Mustangs won the award for the second year in a row and for the fifth time in the last six years. Morningside piled up 156 points to win this year's GPAC sports crown by a 12.5-point margin over runner-up Concordia University. The Mustangs led all schools with 79.5 points in the men's sports and were second with 76.5 points in the women's sports. Schools receive points based on the regular season standings in 19 conference sports. Morningside won regular season GPAC championships in football, women's cross country and softball.

# Tennis teams set records

The women's tennis team had a 154 record and the men's tennis team had a 149 record to set school records for wins in a season. Cassie Stanek finished her career with school-record totals of 53 singles victories and 102 combined singles and doubles triumphs for the women's team.

# College hosts NAIA Softball National Championship

Morningside was one of 10 locations across the country selected as an opening round site for the NAIA Softball National Championship.

Morningside, Ottawa University, Reinhardt
University and the University of Jamestown competed, from which Ottawa advanced to the NAIA Softball World Series. A national tournament qualifier for the eighth time in the last nine years, Morningside posted a 40-12 record and captured its third GPAC Championship in the last four years. Rachel Henks was a second-team NAIA All-American and Rachel Koch was the GPAC Player of the Year. Elin Landgren set an NAIA national record after she was hit by a pitch 72 times in her career.

#### TRACK AND FIELD EARNS ALL-AMERICA HONORS

The Mustangs earned All-America honors in the men's 3200-meter relay in both the indoor and outdoor seasons as well as the women's indoor distance medley and women's outdoor 3200-meter relays. Michelle Mumm, Jacob Green and Jason Kenny earned NAIA All-America honors in the 1000 meters in the indoor track and field season.



Bryce Koch was an NAIA II honorable mention All-American.

# Basketball teams both top 20 wins

The women's basketball team posted a 24-9 record to extend its streak to 14 consecutive 20-win seasons and 15 straight NAIA Division II National Tournament appearances. Lexi Ackerman was a third-team NAIA II All-American to cap a career where she finished as the seventh-leading scorer in Morningside history with 1,674 points, while guard Madison Braun was an honorable mention All-American. The men's basketball team also accomplished a 20-win season with a 21-10 record. The team showed vast improvement from an

11-18 finish the previous year. The increase of 10 wins was one of the largest victory jumps in the nation in the NAIA II ranks. Ryan Tegtmeier finished his career as the 10th leading scorer in Morningside history with 1,349 points, and Bryce Koch earned NAIA II honorable mention All-America honors.

#### DANCE AND CHEER TEAMS TAKE HONORS

The cheer team took top honors at the GPAC Championships, while the dance team finished sixth at the NAIA Competitive Cheer and Dance National Championships. Kayla Inlay and Melanie Kiser were NAIA Competitive Cheer All-Americans, while Inlay, Miranda Shipley and Jenna Winkler were honorable mention All-Americans in competitive dance.

# SWIMMER MAKES HISTORY

Suzanna Gonzalez made history at the NAIA Swimming and Diving National Championships when she became Morningside's first-ever NAIA All-America swimmer. Gonzalez accomplished the feat when she swam a school-record time of 5:00.00 to finish second in the women's 500-yard freestyle. She went on to also earn All-America laurels with a school-record time of 17:27.77 for a third-place finish in the 1650-yard freestyle. Also this season, Gonzalez broke five school records and was named NAIA National Swimmer/Diver of the Month and the Liberal Arts Championships Women's Swimmer of the Meet.

# Noteworthy Feats

Keegan Hessler and Steven Garcia earned All-America honors with sixth-place finishes in the 125 and 149 lb. divisions at the NAIA Wrestling National Championships. Jacob Lamoreux was the GPAC Baseball Player of the Year and set a school record with 311 career hits. Nathan DeChaine was an NAIA honorable mention All-American.

Corey Matthey won the GPAC Men's Golf Individual Championship and finished 23rd at the NAIA Men's Golf National Championship.

# It Turns Out Like This

Professor writes award-winning novel

Dr. Stephen Coyne joined the faculty at Morningside

College in 1988. He teaches American literature and
creative writing and serves as faculty adviser for Kiosk,
the college's literary magazine. His stories have appeared
in such journals as North American Review, New England
Review, The Southern Review and The Georgia Review.
He has received a number of writing awards, including the
Roberts Writing Award, Heartland Fiction Prize and
Prairie Schooner Readers' Choice Award.

Dr. Stephen Coyne, professor of English, had his book "It Turns Out Like This" published after winning the Many Voices Award from New Rivers Press.

His book was chosen from almost 400 entries around the world. Six months later, it won the Midwest Book Award for Short Stories from the Midwest Independent Publishing Association.

"It's terrific to have a creative writing professor produce a book widely regarded as a very fine piece of fiction," said President John Reynders. "And for our Faculty Book Club to have the opportunity to sit with the author and discuss how he wrote the book was really fun."

"It Turns Out Like This" is the life story of Stu Jakes, told in snapshots from his impoverished but spiritually rich childhood to his later years living on a crabbing boat and every hard turn in between.

"A vivid and haunting novel-in-stories," said Alan Davis, a judge for the Many Voices Award. "Stu is a flawed, ordinary man living a hardscrabble life both before and after his wife leaves him. Stephen Coyne writes with precision and lyricism about a particular place in a mature style that reminds me of Larry Brown, John Yount and Raymond Carver."

Every chapter in the book originally appeared in a top-tier publication as a short story except for the last two chapters, which Coyne wrote to pull the novel together. Many of the stories have won awards.

"What took me a while to see was that there was a larger story, a book-length story, within some of the short stories I had published," Coyne said. "Then it was a matter of drawing out that larger story."

Coyne wrote all but one of the short stories during his time at Morningside College. Even so, the book focuses on working class people living in the Mid-Atlantic region of the East Coast.

"I'm drawn to the lives of blue collar people – always have been," Coyne said. "Education is a wonderful thing, but it creates a kind of insulation between a person and experience. It creates coping mechanisms to minimize stress – to maximize possibilities or diminish mistakes. Without it, you're a little bit more exposed to the world."

The setting reflects Coyne's childhood in New Jersey

and 18 years in North Carolina, where he earned his bachelor's and master's degrees and worked as a carpenter's helper, welder and fast food manager and later as a journalist and community college instructor. Coyne came to Morningside after completing his Ph.D. at the University of Denver.

"Morningside has become my home over the years, but it's far from my home," Coyne said. "Writing those stories here was a way for me to go home virtually."

Dr. Greg Guelcher, professor of history, read "It Turns Out Like This" and fell in love with the prose.

"Every other page, I'd read a carefully-crafted line of his writing and think, 'Wow! It can't get any better than this,'" he said. "Then I'd read on to the next page and experience the very same sensation! It makes for very compelling reading."

Dr. Bruce Forbes, professor of religious studies, agreed. "It's a wonderful read," he said. "You can tell that every word is carefully chosen."

Student Mariah Wills saw a lot of truth in the book. For example, in the chapter "How Love Feels," she appreciated the first sentence, "Hope made you lean forward."


Wills said it means a lot to her that Coyne has had poems and short stories published in top-tier publications, and now he has published an award-winning book.

"To me, it means that he knows what you have to do in order to get published, which is something that I find very helpful because I do want to be published someday."

Coyne said his students have inspired him as a writer throughout his years at the college.

"It's great to be around a bunch of people who are trying to write stories and poems because that's what I'm trying to do," he said. "What could be better for a writer than to hang around people who think writing matters and who are trying to get better at it? It's good for the students to be around a teacher like that, and it's good for the teacher to be around students like that."

Outside evaluators selected the recipients.


Criteria for selection included teaching excellence, effective advising, scholarship and service to the college during the previous academic year.

He became immersed in campus culture by throwing himself into committee work, even taking on leadership roles.

# Beloved professor passes away

Dr. Mark "Doc" Heistad died April 17, 2017, of esophageal cancer while at his sister Carolyn Heistad's house in Duluth, Minn., high on a hill overlooking Lake Superior. He was 59.

Doc joined the faculty at Morningside College in 2002 and served as an associate professor of mass communication until this spring, when he took medical leave.

"He is going to be remembered as a great professor, colleague and human being," said Dave Madsen, assistant professor and chair of mass communication. "We'll certainly miss him in our department as the force behind our student-run radio station, KMSC, and our very busy sports broadcasting program."

Students said Doc had a big impact on them.

"I almost called it quits many times – almost dropped out several times," said Tom Chilton 2012. "Doc was there with me in



his office, in the trenches, pulling me, dragging me along, saying, 'You can do this. You're going to graduate. You're not going to quit. You're talented. You're so much better than you think you are."

Kaitlyn Polk just got to know Doc this fall, her first semester at Morningside.

"I may not have known Doc long, but it doesn't take that much time for someone to have an impact on your life," she said. "He helped me realize that I've just got to do what I love and go for it."

Doc loved his students as much as they loved him, according to his brother.

"His life blood was his students," said Dr. David Heistad during a tribute on Minnesota Public Radio. Doc worked in public radio for over 15 years and received state, regional and national awards. "He

wasn't married - didn't have kids himself - but his students were his family and really gave a lot back to him too."



# MAKING HER MARK Writer finds success, inspires others

1997, an award-winning creative writer, shares her talent with others through a prison-writing workshop.

Even though she followed a non-traditional path to graduation, starting at Morningside College and then marrying, having children and returning to Morningside some years later to finish her degree, Bowen Hicks relished her time at Morningside.

"I loved hanging out in the computer lab," she said. "Talking and suffering late into the night with other students was fun. I also loved keeping the dorm door open to the hallway, so anyone walking by might stop and chat. It was a warm community."

She also enjoyed her English professors.

"Dr. Steve Covne was a

real live writer who wrote fiction about Southerners, which I thought was the most exciting and intimidating thing in the world," she said. "He said nice things about one of my poems during a workshop, which made my decade. **Dr. Marty** (Steele) Knepper 1972 had a big-hearted, geeky infatuation with Shakespeare that was contagious. And

Dr. Ed Mazeika told me I was a writer right when I needed to hear that."

Bowen Hicks followed up her Morningside education with a master's degree in journalism from the University of Iowa and a master's degree in creative writing from the Vermont College of Fine Arts. She also attended writing workshops and conferences and supplemented her income through teaching.

Bowen Hicks' experiences eventually cultivated an interest in bringing writing workshops to the area prisons around St. Paul, Minn. She contacted several wardens, and several agreed to host a workshop. The class went so well that she gathered a group of other writers to come and teach. The classes soon took on a life of their own in the form of the Minnesota Prison Writing Workshop, with Bowen Hicks as the founder and artistic director.

About 20 creative workshops are offered to 200 inmates across the state of Minnesota each year. During the classes, writers teach craft and offer readings, and participants share their own work. In addition to helping the inmates refine the invaluable skill of writing, the classes help



them live a more examined life. Fifty participants also take part in a mentor program.

Bowen Hicks has found success in her own right. Her work has appeared or is forthcoming in Orion, The Iowa Review, The Kenyon Review online. The Rumpus. North American Review and Third Coast. She received special mention in a Pushcart Prize anthology and in an edition of The Best American Essays. She has won awards for her fiction and her nonfiction. She is currently working on an essay collection.

When asked what wisdom she would impart to Morningside students, Bowen Hicks said, "Figure out what you love, and go for it."

blazes a trail. This was especially true at Drake Law School in Des Moines, Iowa, where he served as president of the Student Bar Association and recently graduated with accolades.

He has done very well, considering that he didn't even realize until his junior year at Morningside College that he wanted to be a lawyer.

Tuttle originally came to Morningside because he wanted to play football - and because it felt like home.

"The college has such a welcoming atmosphere, and since going to Morningside has been a family tradition – my parents and sister are alumni – it felt like the right choice," he said.

Tuttle found success in his four years as a linebacker on the football team. In 2010, he was the GPAC Defensive Player of the Year and an American Football Coaches Association NAIA All-American.

"Coach Casey Jacobsen made it clear he wanted me to succeed - not only in football - but academically and personally as well," he said. "He brought out the best in me."

In the classroom, Tuttle

thought he would become a social studies teacher. But his professors pushed him to think outside the box about where a history major might lead. During his junior year, Lillian Lopez, who is now vice president for advising, asked whether he had ever considered a career in law.

"I confessed I had not, but then she presented me with the opportunity to intern with Shuck Law Firm, a firm in downtown Sioux City," he said. "I thought, 'Why not?'"

Attorney Dan Shuck took Tuttle to depositions and trial and really gave Tuttle a taste of what practicing law was like. When it came time to apply, Tuttle said he was struck by the support he received from Morningside.

"President Reynders wrote me a recommendation, as did two alumni, Tom Flynn 1968 and Jerry Foxhoven 1974, who live in the Des Moines area. Morningside not only equipped me to go to law school with an excellent education and experiential learning opportunities; people at the college helped to see me successfully through the process."

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

# **COMEBACK STORY** Professors help student reach potential

#### **Todd Carnes 2013**

conducts research for a multinational corporation. But during his time at Morningside College, he struggled academically. He gives his professors credit for helping him turn things around.

"I spent significantly more time socializing and meeting new people than I did studying or attending class," he said. "My freshman and sophomore years, I was able to slide by on my intelligence and good graces. But my junior year, I failed two courses, and Dr. Greg Guelcher was threatening to fail me in a third if I didn't attend class.

"It was an epiphany – a true wake-up call – and I am thankful my professors cared enough about me to hold me accountable."

Carnes re-enrolled in the courses he failed and excelled, earning the respect of his professor, Dr. Chris Spicer. He attended an Association for Computing Machinery conference with another professor, Dean Stevens, and realized he faced a lot of competition in his field

So Carnes began to pursue academic challenges. The more difficult the

challenge, the more he committed himself to finding a solution. His senior year included developing a game engine, which he used to recreate the original Pokemon game. This impressed Great West Casualty Co., where he got an internship and a job upon graduation. Carnes worked there for a year before creating a start-up with three college friends. They developed a fleet tracking app.

Although the start-up did not last, Carnes used the success of the app to procure a job with Triton Services in Maine. Carnes worked from home, which gave him the independence to dabble in a few side projects, including teaching himself android programming.

Triton eventually brought Carnes out to the West Coast, where his initiative attracted the attention of Pipeline. For Pipeline, he developed integrated solutions for nuclear power plants for a year before he was hired to join the research team at Sharp Laboratories of America, a division of Sharp Corporation.

Carnes works with 18 researchers whose work paves the way for new products and services for



Sharp and its partners. He collaborates with Fortune 500 companies around the world. In September, he was named a senior software engineer in research.

Carnes has had to work hard to prove himself. "I'm the first one in our Santa Ana office, but I am also the first one out," he said with a laugh. "I enjoy the freedom of my job, the challenges I encounter every day, and how rewarding it is to come up with something completely new that no one else has thought of previously."

He doesn't just challenge himself professionally. He recently took up hiking and completed a 15-mile trek up the Santiago Peak in Southern California. He also volunteers at the Nicholas Academic Centers in Santa Ana, where he tutors middle and high school students.
